Scouting is family values ... but Cub Scout age youth don't join Scouting just to get their character built - they join because it is fun.

CUB SCOUT PROGRAM



Kindergarten

YOUTH THIS AGE ARE MEMBERS OF A LION DEN

1. Lions must be in Kindergarten to participate.
2. Each Lion den has five to eight youth who meet together to participate in the Lion program with their adult partner.
3. Led by a den leader (usually a parent) and an assistant.
4. The den meets about twice a month (depending upon the den leader's schedule).
5. The Cub Scout adventure begins with the Lions using a program of exciting indoor and outdoor activities designed for kindergarten youth and their adult partner. Adults are there as a support and guide, and allow the new Cub Scout to discover the activities and consequences under adult supervision. The youth will learn by doing these things themselves, and as they learn and grow your relationship with them will grow as well.

First Grade



YOUTH THIS AGE ARE MEMBERS OF A TIGER DEN

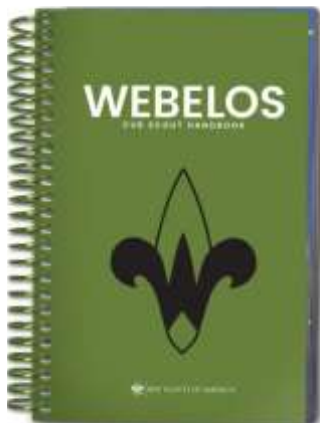
1. Each den has five to eight youth/adult teams.
 2. The den gets together four times each month:
 - 2 den meetings
 - 1 field trip or outing
 - 1 Pack meeting (with all of the other dens)
 3. Each youth/adult team takes turns hosting the meetings. Meetings are conducted by the Tiger Den Leader and last no more than one hour.
4. Advancement
- To earn the Tiger badge, a child must complete six required adventures with their den or family and one elective adventure of their den or family's choosing. As the child completes each adventure, they will receive the adventure loop for that adventure, which they can wear on their belt. When the child has completed the seven required adventures, they can receive the Tiger badge.
 - After a child has earned the Tiger badge, a Tiger Scout can work on the remaining 12 Tiger electives until they finish first grade (or turn 8 years old). A child can choose elective adventures that may show them new hobbies and teach them skills that will be useful during their Scouts BSA years.



Second & Third Grade

YOUTH THIS AGE ARE MEMBERS OF A WOLF OR BEAR DEN

1. 2nd grade youth are in a Wolf Den, while 3rd grade youth are in a Bear den.
2. Each den has five to eight children.
3. Led by a den leader (usually a parent).
4. The den leader is assisted by an assistant den leader, and sometimes a den chief (an older Scout).
5. The den meets about once a week (depending upon the den leader's schedule).
6. Den meetings have games, crafts, songs, ceremonies, and periodic field trips revolving around a monthly theme.
7. To earn the Wolf or Bear badge, a child must complete six required adventures and one elective adventure. The parent or guardian and den leader approves each requirement by signing their book, and the child receives an adventure loop for each adventure.



Fourth & Fifth Grade

YOUTH THIS AGE ARE MEMBERS OF A WEBELOS/ARROW OF LIGHT DEN

1. Each den has five to eight children.
2. Led by a Webelos den leader (usually a parent).
3. The Webelos den leader is assisted by an assistant den leader, and sometimes a den chief (an older Scout).
4. The den meets about once a week (depending upon the den leader's schedule).
5. Den meetings have games, crafts, songs, ceremonies, and periodic field trips revolving around a monthly theme.
6. Webelos Scouts get to work on the five required Webelos adventures and choose two of the 18 elective adventures that are shared by the Webelos and Arrow of Light ranks.
7. When a child has done the requirements for an adventure, the Webelos den leader, rather than a parent, approves most of the adventures. For each adventure a child completes, they receive a pin to wear on the Webelos colors or on their hat.



THE CUB SCOUT PACK



ALL KINDERGARTEN THROUGH FIFTH GRADE YOUTH ARE MEMBERS OF A PACK

1. Packs are made up of one or more dens.
2. Packs meet once a month—all Lion, Tiger, Wolf, Bear and Webelos families are expected to participate.
3. The pack meeting is led by the Cubmaster.
4. The pack meeting is the highlight of the month.
5. Pack meetings have games, skits, songs, ceremonies, and presentations of belt loops, pins & badges that the children have earned during the month.

THE PACK IS RUN BY THE PACK COMMITTEE

1. All parents, den leaders, and pack leaders can be members of the pack committee.
2. The pack committee meets once a month or more often if needed.
3. Committee meetings are led by the committee chairperson.
4. The committee selects leaders, finds meeting places, performs record keeping, manages pack finances, orders awards, coordinates fundraising projects, helps train leaders, and recognizes leaders.

THE PACK IS OWNED BY A CHARTERED ORGANIZATION

1. Chartered organizations include schools, religious organizations, service clubs, and other organizations interested in youth.
2. The chartered organization approves all leaders in the pack, provides a meeting place for the pack meetings, and helps the pack follow the BSA guidelines and policies.
3. The chartered organization selects a chartered organization representative who serves as the contact person for your pack.

THE ADVANCEMENT TRAIL

On the advancement trail, a Cub Scout progresses from rank to rank, learning new skills as they go. Each of the ranks and awards has its own requirements. As your child advances through the ranks, the requirements get more challenging.

LION



The Lion rank is for youth who are in kindergarten. To earn the Lion badge, a child must complete five required adventures with their den or family. There are also seven elective adventures that can be completed. As the child completes each adventure, they will receive a sticker for their Lion Adventure Book. When they have completed the five required adventures, they can receive the Lion badge.

BOBCAT

No matter what age or grade a child joins Cub Scouting, they must earn the Bobcat badge before they can advance to the rank of Tiger, Wolf, Bear, or Webelos. They must complete the Bobcat requirements, one of which is: learn and say the Cub Scout motto, the Scout Oath, and the Scout Law and tell what they mean.



TIGER



The Tiger rank is for youth who are in first grade or are age 7. To earn the Tiger badge, a child must complete six required adventures with their den or family and one elective adventure of their den or family's choosing. As the child completes each adventure, they will receive the adventure loop for that adventure, which they can wear on their belt. When the child has completed the seven required adventures, they receive the Tiger badge.

WOLF

The Wolf rank is for youth who have finished first grade (or who are 8 years old). To earn the Wolf badge, a child must complete six required adventures and one elective adventure. Their parent or guardian and den leader approves each requirement by signing their book, and the child receives an adventure loop for each adventure. When the child has met all requirements, the Wolf badge is presented.





BEAR

The Bear rank is for youth who have finished second grade (or who are 9 years old). To earn the Bear badge, a child must complete six required adventures and one elective adventure. Their parent or guardian and den leader approves each requirement by signing their book, and the child receives an adventure loop for each adventure. When the child has met all requirements, the Bear badge is presented.

WEBELOS

Webelos dens are for youth who have completed third grade (or reached age 10). Webelos Scouts get to work on the five required Webelos adventures and choose two of the 18 elective adventures that are shared by the Webelos and Arrow of Light ranks. When a child has done the requirements for an adventure, the Webelos den leader, rather than a parent, approves most of the adventures. For each adventure a child completes, they receive a pin to wear on the Webelos colors or on their hat. After completing seven adventures, including five required adventures and two elective adventures, a Scout can receive the Webelos badge.



ARROW OF LIGHT

The highest rank in Cub Scouting is the Arrow of Light. Earning this rank prepares a Webelos Scout for their crossover to Scouts BSA. Webelos must complete four required adventures and three elective adventures to earn the Arrow of Light rank. For each adventure a child completes, they receive a pin to wear on their Webelos colors or on their hat.



The Arrow of Light badge is the only Cub Scout badge that can be worn on the Scouts BSA uniform when a child graduates into a Troop. Adult leaders who earned the Arrow of Light rank when they were young may also show their achievement by wearing a special square knot on their adult uniform.

Once a child joins a Scouts BSA Troop, he starts working towards the rank of Scout. He continues through the ranks; Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life and then Eagle Scout - the highest award available in the Scouts BSA program.



SPECIAL EVENTS & PROGRAMS



PINEWOOD DERBY

The Pinewood Derby is an exciting project where a parent helps the child build a model race car made from a block of wood. The finished car must weigh 5 ounces or less. Your pack leaders will give you more details, including when the big race will be held.

JOURNEY TO EXCELLENCE

Scouting's "Journey to Excellence" is the BSA's council performance recognition program designed to encourage and reward success and measure the performance of our units, districts, and councils. The "Scouting for Food" campaign conducted by the Scouts each spring is one of the Journey to Excellence projects.



CUB SCOUT FALL FAMILY BASH SPOOK-O-REE

Spook-O-ree is an exciting activity scheduled for October 16-18, 2020 at Camp Birch. It's a great way to spend quality time with your family. Fishing, hiking, making crafts, playing games, singing songs, - it's got it all. Learn archery, study nature, shoot bb guns and even enjoy a hay ride! This is the kind of fun Cub Scouts expect when they join.

BLUE AND GOLD BANQUET

The Blue & Gold Banquet is a party celebrating the birthday of Cub Scouting and is usually held in February. Most often it includes dinner and a special program or entertainment. A Webelos graduation ceremony may also be conducted at the Blue & Gold Banquet.





Depending upon the age of your child, they can attend Cub Scout Day Camp, Wolf Bear Camp, Webelos Resident Camp or a combination. These programs are held at Camp Birch or in the local area. All programs offer exciting summertime activities that include swimming, crafts, games, nature, bb guns, archery, sports, songs, and skits. During Cub Scout Day Camp, Scouts return home every day, but during Webelos Resident Camp, they stay overnight in tents. Wolf Bear Camp is a Cub Scout and parent overnight program just for Wolves and Bears.

DRUG PREVENTION

When a child has positive, supporting elements in their life, they are much less likely to become involved with drugs. The BSA has a resource called "Drugs: A Deadly Game! Choose To Refuse" that helps leaders and families talk to youth about drugs. It is available through the council.



BOYS' LIFE MAGAZINE

Boys' Life

A magazine for Scouts and adults, Boys' Life has interesting features on Scouting, sports, hobbies, magic, science, and U.S. history. There are also jokes, comics, and short stories. A one year magazine subscription is \$12 (pro-rated at \$1 per issue). Compare this to the cost of a comic book!

CUB SCOUT MOTTO

Do Your Best

Cub Scouting is a home and neighborhood centered program designed to support family values for children in kindergarten through fifth grades. Each Cub Scout learns to respect their home, country, God, and other people. The program also helps children this age to:

- Learn new physical skills through sports, crafts, and games.
- Learn how to get along with others through group activities.
- Develop new mental skills such as writing and calculating.
- Develop personal independence.

In society where your child is often taught that winning is everything, Cub Scouting teaches them to "do their best" and be helpful to others as expressed in the Scout Oath.

A Cub Scout den provides your child with a group of youth their own age in which they can earn status and recognition. In the den, they will also gain a sense of personal achievement with the new skills they learn.





HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Scouting operates with volunteer leadership. Volunteer leaders are an example of Scouting's principle of service to others. Naturally, parents are the primary source of leaders in the Scouting program. You volunteer not only to serve Scouting, but also to grow with your child and their friends, and have the chance to be a positive influence on the youth in your community.

WHAT DO YOU RECEIVE IN RETURN?

Being a leader is fun, challenging, and rewarding. Leaders find that their experiences in Cub Scouting help them to become better parents. The following are some of the many dividends that will enrich your life as you dedicate your time, talent, and enthusiasm to Scouting:

- Fun and fellowship with other families, sharing your pride in the Scouts' accomplishments.
- The privilege of helping to enrich and strengthen families.
- A chance to help children learn to participate in citizenship and to help shape them into adults who have strength of character and are sensitive to the needs of others.
- The opportunity to help make a difference in the lives of children as they grow strong in mind and body.
- A code to live by which includes setting a worthwhile example for both children and adults.
- The satisfaction of being a member of a worldwide movement, and the pride in being identified as a part of the organization. Wearing the Scout uniform is a visible means of showing you believe in and stand up for the values of the BSA.

PACK VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP (examples of ways you can help)

CUBMASTER

Helps plan the pack program with the help of the pack committee. Serves as the master of ceremonies at the monthly pack meeting. Attends the pack committee meetings.

ASSISTANT CUBMASTER

Assists the Cubmaster as needed. Fills in for the Cubmaster when necessary.

COMMITTEE CHAIRPERSON

Presides at the pack committee meetings. Helps recruit adult leaders. Also attends pack meetings.

ADVANCEMENT COORDINATOR

Maintains advancement records for the pack. Orders all badges, awards, and insignia. Attends pack meetings and committee meetings.

DEN LEADER

Leads the den at weekly den meetings. Attends the monthly pack meeting and pack committee meetings.



PACK COMMITTEE

Pack committee members perform administrative support functions of the pack. Some may serve as the pack popcorn coordinator or newsletter editor.

SECRETARY / TREASURER

Keeps records for the pack, including pack bank account, financial records, etc. Attends pack meetings and pack committee meetings.

PARENT HELPERS

Perform "one time" program jobs such as coordinating pack participation in events such as Scouting for Food, Pinewood Derby, Blue and Gold Banquet, Day Camp, etc. These jobs are of short duration.

- A monthly leaders' meeting for all adult volunteers is held once a month in your district. You can get help with crafts, games, skits, and songs for use at den and pack meetings. These meetings (called Roundtables) are a great place to ask questions and share ideas.
- The **Den Leader Guide** contains meeting plans for den meetings and show how to do crafts and games. Many packs purchase the guide for their leaders.
- Many packs have a pack library that contains the leader books and resources you need.
- Your district (see counties above) has a team of volunteers which offer district wide programs and activities where your children can participate.
- Your district also has a volunteer team called the commissioner staff. They are our "service team." They are a communication link between your pack and the council. A commissioner is assigned to assist your pack.
- Your district has leader training available. All leaders need training!

CUB SCOUT LEADER TRAINING



Step 1 - Youth Protection Training (YPT)

So you're a new leader! The first step is to complete the mandatory Youth Protection Training. The BSA has training available online at <https://my.scouting.org/>. Then click this button to get started: Once completed, please attach a copy of your training certificate to your adult application and turn it into your Pack so that they can get you registered. YPT must be taken prior to registration, and must be renewed every two years!



Step 2 - Position Specific Training

After you have completed YPT, the next step is to complete position specific training. This training will give you a more in-depth understanding of your new leadership position and the Cub Scouting program. This training is also available at <https://my.scouting.org/>. Step 3 - Supplemental Training

After you have completed YPT and Position Specific Training, you will be well on your way. YOUTH PROTECTION



After selection of the best possible leaders, additional protection for children is built into the program. The BSA has adopted the following policies to provide security for youth in Scouting.

Two Deep Leadership - Two registered adult leaders or one registered adult leader and a parent of a participant, one of whom must be at least 21 years of age, are required on all trips and outings. The chartered organization is responsible for ensuring that sufficient leadership is provided for all activities.

No One-on-One Contact - One-on-One contact between adults and youth members is not permitted in any situation. Personal conferences should take place in view of other adults and youths.

Respect of Privacy - Adult members must respect the privacy of youth members in situations such as changing clothes or taking showers at camp. Adults should intrude only to the extent that health and safety require. They should also protect their own

privacy in similar situations.

Separate Accommodations - When camping, no youth is permitted to sleep in the tent of an adult other than his own parent or guardian.

Proper Preparation for Activities - All activities should consider the capabilities of the participating Cub Scouts. No activity should be undertaken without the proper preparation, equipment, clothing, supervision, and safety measures.

No Secret Organizations - The BSA does not recognize any secret organizations as part of its program. All activities are open to observation by parents and leaders.

Appropriate Attire - Proper clothing for activities is required.

Constructive Discipline - Discipline used in Cub Scouting should be constructive and reflect Scouting's values. *Corporal punishment is never permitted.*

Hazing Prohibited - Physical hazing and initiations are prohibited and may not be included as part of any Scouting activity.

Parents are a critical element in the education of Cub Scouts about child abuse. The BSA publishes a booklet, "How to Protect Your Children from Child Abuse: A Parent's Guide," that is inserted in the front of each Cub Scout handbook. The BSA also has an award-winning video, *It Happened to Me*, for use by Cub Scout packs and dens. This video about child sexual abuse is available from the Tecumseh Council. Training is also available on our website.

COUNCIL SERVICE CENTER AND SCOUT STORE

The Clark and Lena Patton Boy Scout Service Center is the headquarters for the Tecumseh Council, Boy Scouts of America. In addition to housing the offices for the council's professional and administrative staff, the service center also includes a **full service Scout Store**. Any item listed in the BSA catalog that is not stocked in the **Scout Store** can be ordered. The Scout Store is also the place to find all BSA advancement related material and insignia.
